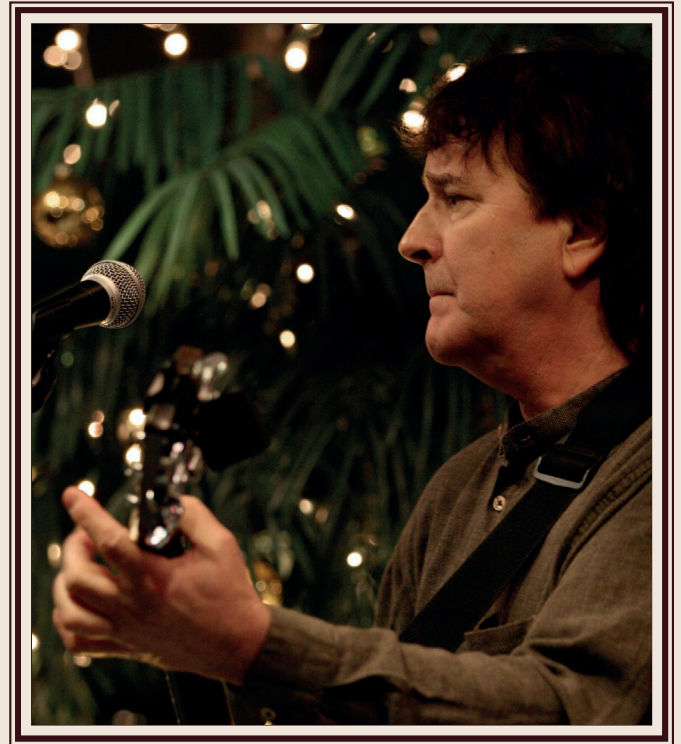

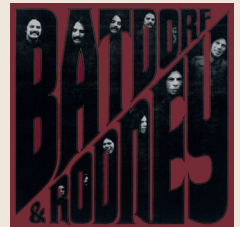

- **Enjoy the Journey:** Whether facing success or setbacks, find joy in the process itself.

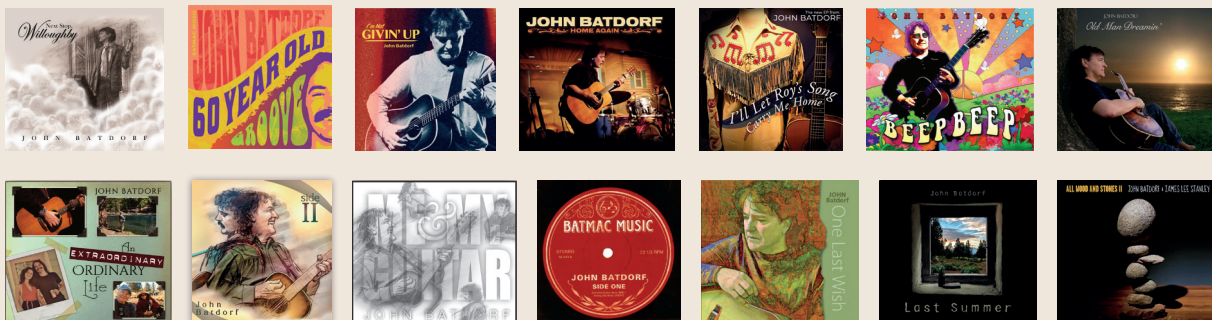


Batdorf and Rodney 1970-1976
